2024 – Year 9: We are excited to notify our school community of an upcoming change to our senior school. In 2024, our year 9 cohort, (who are our **current year 8's)**, will join our senior school, and will no longer be attached to the middle school. This change will mean our year 9 students will no longer be 'home roomed' but rather will be placed into a 'core class' where they will attend English, Maths, Science, Social Studies and PE/Health in their 'core class'. Students will be taught by senior subject teachers. They will also continue to experience a range of rotating 'specialist' classes throughout the year. We have made this change because we want to prepare our students for years 11-13 (Levels 1-3 NCEA). We are hopeful students will gain an in-depth understanding of what is required of them when they reach year 11.

Form Rooms: Year 7&8 students will remain in their homeroom class during form time. All senior school students will be placed into a vertical form room where they will join other year level students in their form class. These will be assigned within our school house system. Each form class will have a form teacher and House Dean who will assist with academic and pastoral matters.

Uniform: From 2024 Year 7&8 students will remain in the blue school polo shirt. Years 9,10, 11 & 12 will wear the **white school shirt**. Our year 13 cohort will wear Mufti. This change will provide a clear distinction between our middle and senior school students.
