

Kia ora te Whanau,

I wanted to share my perspective on why teachers from kindergarten, primary, intermediate, and secondary schools felt the need to strike.

The decision to strike was not made lightly, and for those who commented on the timing of this strike, you might not know that negotiations started over a year ago. Negotiations only occur with the government every 3 years. The government could have sorted this months ago. Ultimately there is never a good time to strike...

Alot of people like to mention the holidays teachers get. Calculations based on how many hours teachers work per week, including the hours worked in the 'school holidays were divided by a normal work year of 48 weeks. On average, teachers work 43+ hours per week, 48 weeks of the year. This did not factor in all the hours worked at interval and lunchbreak when teachers are on duty or supervising sports or sorting issues, talking on the phone to a parent or specialist etc, school camps, school event evenings, parent teacher interviews and report writing... For anyone who gets hung up on teachers getting 'all those holidays', rest assured, teachers ARE doing a full year's worth of work, it is just intensely organised into fewer weeks over the year compared to a regular job, and the pay is also spread over the entire year.

Teachers deserve fair pay. With the minimum wage going up to \$22.70 per hour from the 1st of April, some unqualified people are making more money than our beginning teachers. These people have no qualifications and have not spent 3+ years training. Sadly, this shows how little teachers are valued. We need fair pay to attract quality teachers. Teachers literally create our future workforce.

Besides the pay, teachers are struggling to do their actual job. The demands are increasing, in volume and complexity. In any one class, a teacher will have children who are gifted, have cognitive delays, foetal alcohol syndrome, ADHD, complex and severe behaviours, children who speak little to no English, and many other needs to cater for. Teachers are often required to design individual education plans, they meet with teams of experts, they design special resources to assist students. It is a struggle to keep up with the current needs of students. As a result, teachers are constantly rushing, busy, overworked and overwhelmed. What you don't see are the tears, the stress, and the number of great teachers simply leaving the profession. This is a huge loss! In addition, teachers are dealing with constant change and new demands in their roles... digital technologies, new curriculum plus many new approaches to teaching, such as structured literacy etc. There are many after hours meetings and extra curricular commitments. Next week for example, we have 3 afternoons where our teachers are required at after school meetings.

As a principal. What do I want? I would like the public to better understand how selfless and giving teachers are. They give everything to their students. They are teachers, social workers, counsellors, health professionals, they feed students, drive them, provide for them out of their own pocket, and they worry about them long after the students go home. I want better conditions for our students and for teachers. I want fair and sufficient funding and resources for my school so that our students can get the education they deserve. I want staffing levels to allow for the complex needs of students. I want funding and units to be fair across all schools.

When we get less staffing we end up with larger classes and we end up having to ask our existing staff to do more. With fewer units we cannot remunerate leadership roles. It limits our ability to attract leaders and support leadership pathways. I want our teachers to have adequate time to do their jobs. I want to give our students the education they deserve. Adequate funding ensures we have programmes and learning coaches in place to support the child, the teacher AND the other children in the class. With adequate funding we could also provide some of the services and programmes our students need... such as counselling, occupational therapy, social workers, etc. These basic resources are required so we can make a difference.

**Things are not ok in education**. The decision to strike is not made lightly, but we can't keep going like this. Just because we love our jobs doesn't mean that we should be under-valued financially both personally and with the resourcing for our school. Thank you for your awhi and understanding.
