A parent's life's work is personified in their children. Life's joys and challenges are encapsulated and made manifest through the lives our children lead. Parents are the first teachers and cheerleaders. Our children can be their parents greatest joy and sometimes their greatest heartache. Parenting in today's world requires individual strategic alignment and at times honesty with self. Reset and review your strategy often to ensure the reality you're living aligns with the unique and individualistic goals and visions for each child in your care. Children do not need to have the latest expensive gadgets, but they do need support from those who care for them full time. Evidence is very clear, children who have support from home can achieve a great deal at school. Dame Whina Cooper said 'Take care of our children. Take care of what they hear. Take care of what they see. For how the children grow, so will the shape of Aotearoa'. I believe she wanted to encourage & remind parents, caregivers and teachers of our duty to our children / students. Children are a reflection of each of us. I know we are not perfect, but we must try harder, we must look deeper into our practices... At WCC this year we have set our mantra as 'stepping up / raising the bar.' We ask parents to help us as we work with our students to teach them how important it is to attend school daily and consistently strive to do their very best. Consistency helps us develop good habits and stay focused. Having high expectations is about supporting and empowering students to learn and achieve personal excellence.

Pastoral System:

This year we have changed our pastoral system from multi-level form rooms to year level form classes. Each student will be in a form class with their year level peers. Form Time will be used to check on attendance, monitor achievement and provide support to students. We endeavour to work closer with whānau. Your child's form teacher will be in touch to introduce themselves. The form teacher should be your first point of contact if you have any concerns or require extra support. For each year level, we also have a dean to assist the year levels.

Attendance: A reminder that schools along with whānau / families are legally responsible to ensure students attend school every day. Going to school every day is important to students to develop skills for lifelong learning. Regular attendance makes a big difference. There's a clear connection between going to school regularly and doing well in the classroom. Higher levels of educational achievement can mean better health, higher incomes, better job stability, and more participation in communities. This all makes society stronger and more connected. Students are required to attend and engage in learning **every day**. Regular attendance means the student is present for more than 90% of the term.

Cell Phones: As per government regulations, cell phones are not permitted at school. If students bring cell phones, they need to be on silent and kept in their school bag. If phones are seen, they will be confiscated and will need to be collected from the front office at the end of the school day.

Vapes: Recent changes to New Zealand's vaping rules have introduced stricter regulations around vapes. New licensing requirements limit the availability of vapes in certain areas, specifically near early childhood centres, schools and marae. Vapes are not permitted at school. Students are NOT permitted to use vapes or have them in their possession. All vapes will be confiscated and destroyed.

"Education is our passport to the future, for tomorrow belongs to the people who prepare for it today." Remember to be an active participant in your education. Turn up to school on time, attend every day, focus in class, do your best, ask for help and get involved.
