The whitewater team travelled all over the country to participate in whitewater slalom events and on several occasions won national titles; some paddlers went on to represent New Zealand in the Under 18 Slalom Team. Members of these teams taught my own children how to kayak and play hockey - along with a few other bad habits - but these trips were more than sport, they took us to parts of New Zealand many students had never visited. These included a road trip to play at a hockey tournament in Alexandra. Many thanks to all the parents and volunteers that helped with these activities.

TE VAKA MĀIA

The Cactus/Te Vaka Māia programme is an exciting opportunity for the students and school to engage with other organisations such as the Police and Te Kupenga Hauora on a shared project which has positive outcomes for rangatahi. It is always a thrill to see students encounter a challenge and grow from conquering that challenge.

The programme is important to WCC because it strengthens student resilience, teaches valuable life skills and also strengthens engagement with Police and Te Kupenga Hauora. Students and adults are all on a shared journey and as such the challenges are shared. Students get to see adults struggle sometimes and they also get to see how they can push through difficulties. This is through everyone pulling together, so they see a model of how to persevere through adversity.

WCC first became involved with the Cactus programme as a result of a collaboration with the Maraenui Police station in 2012. That collaboration and connection remains strong and there are other Police initiatives that have been easier to implement at WCC due to that strong relationship.

Over 30 students showed interest in the Cactus programme in 2021, 9 Police, 6 Te Kupenga Hauora staff and a handful of teachers at WCC who contributed in a range of ways. The adults either trained with the students, helped out with providing breakfast or contributed around the edges with washing t-shirts, tea towels and generally just getting stuck in to doing what was required.

One of the highlights was turning up at 5.15am in the morning and seeing students already at school in the gym, shooting hoops or hitting a volleyball or throwing a rugby ball around, prior to the start of the session. Their enthusiasm and willingness to take on this challenge is inspirational. Another highlight was working with different organisations, knowing that we are all ultimately working for the benefit of the students.



The main challenge this year has simply been the lockdown which had a major disruptive effect on the training programme. Students arrived back after lockdown at more or less 'square one'. It was impressive to see students come back together with a very short time frame to train towards the longest day. Some mornings were cold and or extremely wet. The fact that so many students are turning up so early in the morning is impressive.

Students grow immensely through this experience. They have seen some students sign up at the start that didn't end up making it all the way through the programme. They are sore and tired from 'the longest day'. They see their peers struggling and the adults struggling too. During 'the longest day' they might have been in a position to help others, or may have needed help from others. Regardless, they were only successful if everybody worked together to achieve as a team. Their contribution is both important and expected. Students are able to reflect on the satisfaction from being able to go the distance, which they can then transfer to other aspects of their lives. Their positive interactions with other students and also all of the supportive adults will resonate for some time.



As someone who is new to the Cactus programme (which will be renamed Te Vaka Māia in 2022 - The Waka of Courage), I would like to take the opportunity to acknowledge all of the Police staff, all of the staff from Te Kupenga Hauora, all of the WCC staff, and all others who have been involved in this valuable partnership between WCC and the Police. It has taken a monumental effort from many contributors to establish, maintain and strengthen this programme. Anyone who has been involved in some way since 2012 has done something really positive for the WCC school community and beyond.

The current Police lead on the Cactus programme is Constable Willie Tran, along with Sgt Phillip Rowden and Snr Constable Che Lind. These three have been a feature of the programme since it's inception and deserve recognition for this.

Also Tessa Robin from Te Kupenga Hauora and her team have been involved for the past three years.

Virginia Engels has been the WCC lead over the years and has worked tirelessly for the benefit of the students and school.

"I Grew Up With Andy" by Finn Copestake, Y13

I grew up with Andy. My earliest memory is arriving at the orphanage. Something had happened to my parents. Or maybe they just didn't want me. I've never been clear on the specifics of how I ended up at an orphanage, but honestly, I've never really wanted to know. None of the other children liked me much, so I quickly grew to be quiet and reserved. I kept to myself a lot, finding my own company more interesting than that of anyone else. But then Andy arrived. He showed up about two years after I had arrived and our friendship grew immediately, like he was just made to be the perfect companion. Andy was nothing like me. He was never content to just sit around doing nothing. Every day he'd have some new game to play, some new activity to do. Andy's games got us into all sorts of trouble, like that time we tried to see how many kids we could splash water on before the adults caught us. In my defense, it was always Andy who came up with the ideas, however, I was often told to stop blaming things on Andy. I suppose I did do that a lot in my childhood.

I went to school with Andy. We would sit together in the back of the classroom and draw every day. Our teachers were never fans of our art, so we ended up in detention a lot. I was never upset about it, though, because I knew Andy would be there with me. When we weren't in class, we'd spend our time sitting on the field and telling each other stories. We'd do our best to make each other laugh, taking turns telling jokes. We used to talk about our plans for the future. We wanted to be forest rangers, away from people. Just us and the forest. The other kids at school avoided us. They looked right through Andy like he wasn't there, and they treated me like I was crazy just for talking to him. Talking with the weirdest kid in school. I didn't think Andy was weird like they all did. He just didn't quite fit in. Even later in high school everyone would avoid us. If it weren't for Andy, maybe I would've had an easier time making friends.

I ran away with Andy. We were living in a foster home at the time. A bunch of kids who never got adopted, instead being taken in by two nice people and provided with food and shelter until we were 18 years of age. But Andy didn't want to wait that long. He knew that there was no room for us to thrive in that place. The people who owned the home were nice enough, but there just wasn't enough money, with all the money available being spread thin between all the kids, and we were constantly limited. They didn't even have a bed for Andy, so we'd take turns sleeping on the floor. I felt guilty about leaving, but Andy assured me it would be okay. We'd go make our own lives, write our own stories. And so late one night, when we were only fifteen, we snuck out the window to go live in the city. We didn't have a plan to survive, but with each other, we were sure we could do anything.

We were very wrong. After two days in the city, we'd had nothing to eat and we were cold, damp and tired. We went back to the foster home, back to safety, and we decided to stay there until we were 18 and ready to leave.

I lost contact with Andy. When we turned 18, Andy just a week after me, we decided to find a place to rent. I managed to get a job at a small clothing store, and we moved into a tiny, two bedroom apartment. Andy, however, never did get a job. Everybody has always just looked right through him as if he wasn't there, so he never could get interviews, and he couldn't do anything without me around. He was on the couch when I left in the mornings, and he was on the couch when I returned. I was getting sick of it. He'd always been the one to convince me to get out there and live my life, so I just couldn't understand why he wouldn't follow his own advice and make his own adventure. When I couldn't stand it any longer, I kicked him out. I closed the door in his face, and I didn't see him again. I found a new roommate, and I kept moving on with my life. Andy never tried to contact me, and I truly have no idea what happened to him after I removed him from my life.

I moved on with my life without Andy. I realized that I was free now. No longer did I avoid hanging out with people in fear of leaving Andy alone, and no longer did people avoid me because of my friendship with Andy. But I missed him. Nobody ever understood me like Andy had. He'd always known just what to say to cheer me up when I was down, and sometimes it was like he knew what I was thinking, like he was in my head. Nevertheless, I still struggled to make friends even though Andy was gone, and it was the loneliest time of my life.

By the time I realised how much happier my life was with Andy around, it had been years since I'd last seen him, on that day I kicked him out. So I decided that maybe I could bring a little bit of that Andy magic back into my life, and I applied for a job as a forest ranger like we'd always planned. I did a trainee ranger course, and before I knew it, I was 31 years old and heading off to work in a forest. I got stationed at a forest near the old foster home Andy and I had lived at and I was excited for this new chapter of my life.

I reconnected with Andy. It was unexpected, but it was one of the happiest moments of my life. Andy had decided to pursue our childhood dream as well, and by some stroke of luck, we found ourselves working together in the same forest. I knew that I could never let anyone or anything separate me and Andy again. Our friendship was the realest thing there was, regardless of whether or not other people could see that. We would spend our days out in the forest, caring for the wildlife, maintaining the walking tracks, cleaning the campgrounds. Just me and Andy. We loved every moment of it. We didn't need other people when we had each other. Neither of us ever found partners, but neither of us wanted to. Throughout all my years, I never felt alone while Andy was around. We were content with just the two of us. The years flew by and retirement grew closer and closer as our bodies slowed. But we were together for every moment.

I spent my life with Andy. I'd never had anyone else that I could call a friend. But I didn't need anyone else, not with Andy around. I'm 94 now, coming close to the end of my days, and some people tell me I'm too old to have an imaginary friend. I don't agree though. I could never be too old for Andy.

Indecisiveness by *Nikau Tipene-Leach, Y11*

I used to be indecisive – now I'm not so sure, Is indecisiveness really that bad?

I used to be indecisive – now I'm not so sure. At first, when thinking of an article topic, I couldn't make up my mind. As a compromise, I decided to write about indecision. Indecisiveness is a condition in which a person cannot decide on something. It can range from being unable to make simple and small decisions to more major ones, to being pathologically indecisive.

In this article I will provide definitions of indecision, ranging from 'I can't make up my mind' through to aboulomania, a severe form of indecision. In doing so, I will try to dispel the myth that indecision is simply a bad habit of the poor thinker – in fact, decision making and choosing is not always easy.

There are many types of indecisiveness each with their own peculiarities. As with most psychological conditions the range is vast, from minor problems to chronic indecisiveness (or aboulomania).

Minor indecisiveness is best exemplified in an ice-cream parlour scenario. You are in an ice cream parlour, but there are so many flavours, cones, toppings, and other things to consider that you simply cannot decide, and it becomes too overwhelming. This type of indecisiveness is normal within people and is unlikely to cause any major issues. One might have a few issues and inconveniences here and there, but otherwise it's nothing to really worry about, although wanting to try and treat it is fine as well.

A good example of major indecisiveness would be the inability to make a decision about something important, like a marriage proposal. Perhaps you simply aren't ready for such a commitment, or some other reason, but you still love your partner very much, and thus are unable to come to a proper decision.

But aboulomania is a mental disorder where one is chronically indecisive. Anxiety, stress, depression, mental anguish are most commonly associated with it, and typically can severely affect one's social skills. While many others may be indecisive, it usually isn't to the extent of aboulomania. The prefrontal cortex, which is tasked with making rational decisions, is able to keep several pieces of information at any given time. This is capable of overwhelming the brain, thus negatively affecting the person's decision making skills, even if the decision is minute. They will try to reason with themselves how and why their choices could lead to a bad outcome, thus leading to overly-critical thinking for every decision. A lack of information, valuation difficulty, and outcome uncertainty can become an obsession. It usually leads to a case of 'paralysis by analysis'.

There is another condition which appears on the DSM 5 criteria for DPD - Dependent person disorder. Someone with dependent personality disorder may have several symptoms, including:

Avoidance of personal responsibility.

Difficulty being alone.

Fear of abandonment and a sense of helplessness when relationships end.

Oversensitivity to criticism.

Pessimism and lack of self-confidence and of course,

Trouble making everyday decisions.

Analysis paralysis is a phenomenon where someone is unable to continue due to being unable to make a concrete decision about something. The decision may not be made due to the concern that a larger problem could potentially arise later, the need for a perfect solution but fear of error, or stalling making the better decision - unaware of possible diminishing returns.

Of course, people with this will usually suffer the most severe consequences, as they will have to suffer through this through most of their lives, taking a great toll on their mental health.

The mechanism behind such indecisiveness is a phenomenon called cognitive dissonance (5) where a person's brain and actions conflict, not agreeing with each other. In order to avoid this friction, our brain tries to justify the decision, coming up with reasons as to why they made the right choice, or that the choice they made was the one they wanted most.

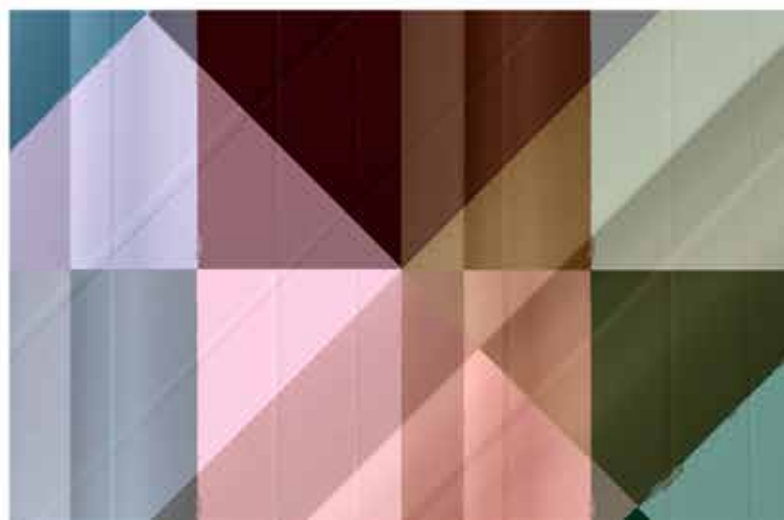
With definitions out of the way, it is easy to see why that is. The saying "A bad decision is better than no decision" exists for a reason, as taking too long to make a choice leaves a high risk of not being able to make one at all. Indecisiveness is certainly a problem, and if one were to want to try and stop themselves from being so indecisive, that is understandable.

However, I do think that, sometimes, indecisiveness has its perks in the right situations. Indecision, at its best, can be good in times where the decision doesn't matter too greatly at that point in time. It allows you to really think things through and decide what you want. An instance of this could be a dilemma of buying a new car. Say that you have two options; an electric car that costs \$25,000, or a gas-powered car that costs \$5000. There's an indecision, as you don't know whether to buy for the sake of the environment or the sake of costs. In the end, however it's ultimately not super important.

Sometimes, it's important to let a choice settle, rather than to immediately try solving it. In some cases, it could be that you are grappling with a complex situation where the decision is appropriately not made at all quickly. Is this indecision? Or is this simply the holding of a complex situation until cognition, the thinking, catches up with the person making the choice. The ability to hold complex thinking is a talent indeed.

Two basketball games held during Labour weekend between past and current students (male and female) is another fine example of how former students are giving something back to their old school and to the sport of basketball. A core of this group of men played basketball for the school in the 80's and came up with the idea in 2017 to raise awareness for suicide prevention as a couple of their old school and basketball mates lost their lives this way. Ex-pupil and local artist, Tony Harrington designed and created a special Taonga through using reclaimed timber - the Draper-Reid Memorial Shield in honour of the two boys. This year, the games also respected the sudden loss of a WCC teacher, respected friend and basketball coach. Apart from a game, kai, korero, and brotherhood, they share important messages such as, forming strong trusting friendships with mates during school that can carry them through and serve them well in life, particularly in tough times. This special event demonstrates the school's core values of Wawatatia-Aspire, Mahia-Act, Ekea-Achieve and how former students can positively influence, contribute and form sound relationships with the WCC school and basketball community.

In 2022, further activities, gatherings and events will be held to strengthen ties with the WCC community. Watch the space! Amar spoke of the many great teachers and great classmates who contributed to who he is today. He believes learning a range of subjects at Colenso helped him become a more balanced person. He always remembers Colenso as a school that gave him free range and a wide berth to explore everything that he wanted to. Amar enjoyed all sciences at Colenso and he kept pursuing this at Otago University.

He achieved a BSc and PhD which allowed him to gain a position at Indiana University. Scientists and inventors that he learned about when he was younger inspired him to be interested and involved with this sort of work.

He works with a group of scientists-in-training doing cutting edge research. They are trying to help clean up water by making molecular 'donuts' that catch salt, and to create new materials that can capture light and use it to make new technology like solar cells. He also has recently co-founded a small business based on the light-capture materials and they are in the early days of making medical lasers. He thoroughly enjoys this work because it gives him the freedom to work on almost anything. He is driven to identify why the molecules he creates and studies could be useful in society.

**Ruby Isaac (nee Gannon)**

Attended WCC 2005-2009

Ruby loved attending William Colenso College and gained a lot from the many opportunities and experiences that were offered. She made friends with a diverse range of people from all different backgrounds, including overseas exchange students.

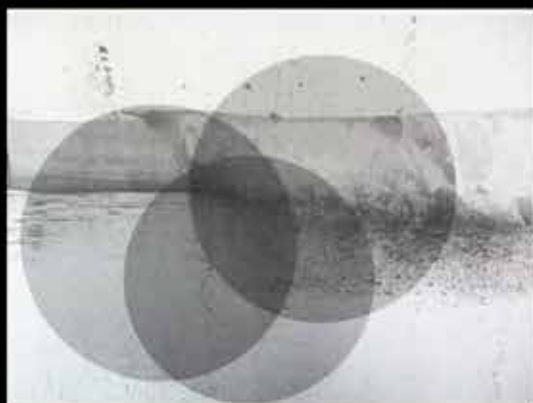
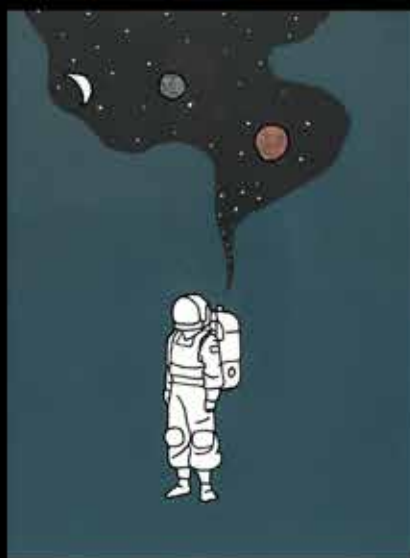

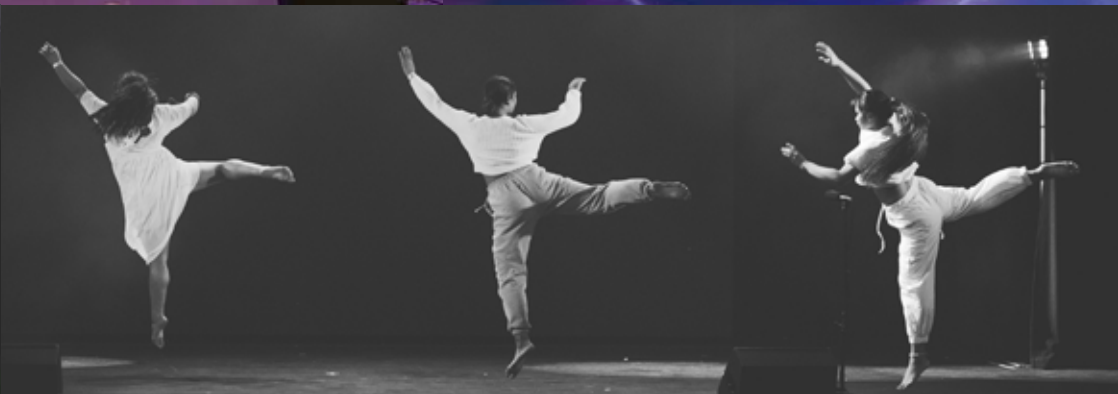

Outward Bound Kaweka Course

In 1933 German educator Kurt Hahn, was exiled from Germany for his criticism of the Nazi Party and Hitler Youth. When World War 2 had begun between Germany and Great Britain, the British military noticed a problem in the navy. When the navy ships were attacked, all the old sailors would out live the younger sailors. Where the young sailors were fitter and in better shape, they were not prepared for the panic and hardship that war brought. The military found out that faulty training was the cause of many unnecessary deaths.

The British Navy came to Kurt Hahn for help to improve the training of the sailors.

Outward Bound was then established in 1941 to help the war efforts. The first school was opened that year, the aim of the school was to teach the young men to be able to face hazards, difficulties, and emergencies of all kinds and be able to handle them with a clear head. The Outward Bound school put them through all sorts of different challenges to test them and harden them. The students were sent out into the mountains, seas and deserts to learn survival and teamwork.

Since 1946 over 30 Outward Bound Schools have been established worldwide. Thousands of young people now go to Outward Bound worldwide. Outward Bound New Zealand was established in 1962 and is now nearly 60 years old and still supporting and shaping NZ youth to this day.

Outward Bound is a non-profit organization meaning that all profit made or given to Outward Bound is brought back into the Outward Bound schools to help improve the experience and the safety of the students.

I enjoyed the Outward Bound experience. The Kaweka course was challenging yet rewarding. The Kaweka course is not easy but it helps build character. At Outward Bound you do all sorts of activities to challenge your body and mind. The activities vary from a 3km run and swim every morning before sunrise and spending your nights walking in the dark to your campsite in the endless bush.

Luckily I was not by myself for this course. Everyone was sorted into groups called watches that consisted of 14 like-minded students. My watchmates were there to help and support me 100% of the way. The Kaweka course takes you out into the natural environment to deepen your connection with nature, provides you with experiences to share and bond with your watch and offers new skills that you can transfer to your day-to-day life back at home.

Not every second of the Kaweka course was challenging, the course gave you moments in between activities to slow down and take in what you learnt. I would have chances to laugh with my watch about our mate flipping over when kayaking in the Rai river and spending my time journaling about the skills and experiences I gained from this course.

One of my treasured moments would be our kayaking. A lot of my watch had never gone kayaking before, nor had they gone down big rapids the day after they learned kayaking. Kayaking for me was great because it taught us to be able to face our fears and power through. Our instructors taught us that dwelling on problems that you fear will make it worse and that kayaking was a really good metaphor for life. When looking downstream, if you focus on every rock, every hole and every hazard the river will appear dangerous and difficult. So instead of focusing on all the spots to avoid, keep your gaze on where you want to go and plan how you will go through with it.

Chelsea

Outward Bound was an amazing experience that I was very fortunate to go on. I'll be honest, at first I thought it was just a fitness camp. Maybe the Deans thought I needed to go for a few runs, cut down on the tubs of ice cream; but it's so much more than that and I see why I was chosen.

The camp itself is dedicated to opening you up, challenging you and bringing out your best qualities - as well as learning about the community and the environment. You are put in a group with 13 complete strangers and you're stuck with them for 3 weeks, but with that comes building strong relationships. My watch (Sheppard 678) did tramping, kayaking, sailing, solo and service. I think my favourite thing was service.

We went to a tree nursery in Blenheim that supports disabled people and gives them a safe place to work. Our job was to cut, trim and tidy up the many flax bushes along their driveway. It was an awesome day full of laughs with my peers and helping out the community - which I really enjoyed.

I'm so glad I was given the opportunity to go to Outward Bound and I highly recommend that others do too. Not only do you get the experience, but you learn so much about yourself and what you're capable of. I had no idea I had the ability to climb a 990 metre tall mountain or sail / row to the Cook Strait and back. At Outward Bound, there was a point where we sat around a fire and talked about our milestones in life. I remember saying that I hadn't hit any milestones yet, but I feel I can safely say the OB was my first and biggest milestone. My final challenge is to figure out what to do with myself next.



Past vs Present Basketball 2021

The William Colenso College Past vs Present basketball game has an underlying purpose which was brought to light by our past men's basketball team - Male Suicide Awareness. Losing two former basketball friends in the late 1980's to this disease still sat heavily on these men's minds. Tony Harrington, a member of the past men's team, is a HB artist who produced the Draper Reid shield dedicated to the two young men - the memory for whom our basketball tournament is played for.

In March this year we were devastated at the loss of one of our staff, a vibrant young teacher of a Year 7 and 8 class, Mr Dan Evans (known by our students as Matua Dan). Dan was a co-founder of "Ngā Taonga Taakaro ki te Matau a Maui". He had previously worked for

Sport HB and taught at Henry Hill and Richmond Primary Schools. Dan loved basketball and coached the WCC junior boys' basketball team.

Tony added Dan's name to the plaque that now graces the Draper Reid Shield and with heavy hearts William Colenso College students played their 2021 Past vs Present basketball game in honour of Mr Dan Evans.

Inspired by a purpose these young men fundraised hard and early for their own uniforms. The school emblem is printed on the right side of the singlet, and Dan Evans' name and number 7 displayed on the left. These boys and a handful of girls' basketball practised continuously over the holidays and after school. The Past Men's basketball team has never been defeated, and these boys weren't taking this game lightly.

With the inclusion of a women's game and wary of Level 2 restrictions of 100 people in our gym, Mrs Bea Carter-Judd offered her husband Dave's business "Wired Up" to live stream the games through the school facebook page. This provided the opportunity



for people anywhere to see the games – including the whānau of student Yves Chen who watched him play from Taiwan. It was also shown in the school hall where the overflow of spectators could watch the games in close proximity to the actual event.

It was heartwarming watching these Past Players reconnecting with each other. Our students were inspired and awed at their presence; I'm sure there were many glances eyeing up the competition before the start!

The day began with karakia then we sat down for whakatau, a short welcome. Tony Harrington and Moana Davis of the Past teams spoke of the importance of the Past vs Present basketball game to them and the friendship they all share. The school was presented with a modified Draper Reid shield with the inclusion of Dan's name. The WCC boys gifted their #7 basketball strip to Dan's partner Mon, who was playing alongside her mum Ange (an ex-student).

We then moved into a much needed 30 minute warm

up as requested by Moana and her women's side. It was great to see some of our not so Past students making up numbers. Old school music from the 80's blasted the gym walls, pumping up adrenaline and enthusiasm. Whānau, past students, friends and teachers came to watch two exciting, heart wrenching displays of basketball played on that day.

Later during the speeches Moana reiterated "It's not about the score but about the kaupapa!"

Past player Ben Kingi's acknowledgement to his teammates: "The connection we had in the late 80's is just as strong as it was yesterday, and we hope this inspires you (the students) to keep your strong bond as you look to the future; to never be afraid to talk to your mates when you're feeling troubled or in a dark space."
